

Message from the Director

Yes, violence exists here in our community—and so does support. Thankfully, since 1992, IWAV has been here to help, with professional, confidential, and free services for people experiencing violence and abuse.

In 2025:

- IWAV's 24/7 crisis line took 457 calls
- 50 women & children stayed at IWAV's Emergency Transition House
- 13 women and 10 children stayed in IWAV's second stage housing called The Cedars, participating in a program of recovery for up to 18 months.
- More than 100 individuals accessed IWAV's counselling, sexual assault services, and support with legal, financial, and housing needs, as well as programs for children and youth of all genders.

In 2015, recognizing that lack of affordable housing is a root cause of intimate partner violence, IWAV became the owner and operator of Croftonbrook – becoming one of the largest providers of affordable housing on Salt Spring. We have now purchased a property at 210 Norton Road, where we plan to develop more housing.

I joined the Board of IWAV in 2015 and became the Executive Director in February of 2023. I'm proud of our legacy supporting those affected by violence and those needing safe, affordable housing. However, we cannot do this work alone. We need community to work together to prevent violence and abuse and help people move forward with their lives.

Norton Road: A Community Milestone

On March 5, IWAV and the Salt Spring Island Foundation welcomed community supporters to ArtSpring to celebrate the purchase of 210 Norton Road —securing another property for affordable housing. The evening offered a moment to acknowledge what has been achieved together, with approximately 60 supporters gathering to connect and reflect on the collective effort that made this possible.

What's Next

With the property now secured, IWAV is beginning the next phase of work. We have formed a new Affordable Housing Development Committee, which met with our Development Consultant, Janis Gauthier, on April 23rd to review some of the challenges and opportunities of the Norton property. Over the next few months, we will be engaging with community partners, organizations and neighbours to understand current housing needs and concerns.

Over the past few months, much of our community's generosity has been directed toward the Norton Road housing project. We are deeply grateful for that support. At the same time, it has created a gap in funding for IWAV's day-to-day operations—counselling, advocacy, crisis response, & prevention services that Islanders rely on.

In response, we launched our first-ever Community Raffle—and once again, the community showed up.

Together, we sold 142 tickets, raising \$1,420 in support of our programs. Tickets were purchased at Transitions Thrift Store, at our Norton Donor Event, and by friends, neighbours, and community members who reached out to participate—we are so thankful to everyone who took part.

The draw took place at the Transitions Thrift Store on March 31, with Retail Manager Gregory and staff member Jane pulling the winning tickets, joined by a few customers to add to the fun.
